


Guide to Finding Career Resources

BOOKS: Background Information

Use the web-based **UW Colleges Catalog** at <http://collib.wisconsin.edu/> to find **books** and other career materials. Here are some suggested terms (**Library of Congress Subject Headings**) to use when searching our Catalog:

vocational guidance or occupations and name of career



For general information try ***career development*** as a search phrase

PERIODICAL ARTICLES: Use a periodical ***Index*** to find **career-related articles** from magazines, journals and newspapers.

Search terms: try ***profession*** or ***employment*** or ***career*** plus your occupation. For example: *teaching* and *profession*. Ask Library Staff for help.

Find the indexes (**and more**) listed below from the Library's Web page through the *Articles and Databases* link at: <http://sheboygan.uwc.edu/library/articles.shtm>.

WilsonWeb (Omnifile): search for articles from six periodical indexes: ***Readers' Guide, Education, General Science, Humanities, Social Sciences,*** and ***Business***. You can search these separately, plus four other subject indexes. Not all articles are in full text.

EBSCOhost (Academic Search Elite, Business Source Elite & more): find articles from thousands of journals, covering a range of academic areas. Not all articles are in full text.

If **full text is not available** for your article, select the  **button** for links to full text or if there is **no full text**, select the **ILLiad interlibrary loan** form to order the article free.
